

## USED TO/ WOULD

. You can use *used to + to infinitive* or *would + infinitive* to talk about regular past actions that don't happen anymore.

*"He used to go to school at 8.00am so he would leave the house early."*

. You can *use used to + to infinitive* (NOT ~~would + infinitive~~) to talk about past states that are no longer true (usually with stative verbs: be, have, love, etc.).

*"He used to be a good student."*

. Don't use *used to* or *would* for single past actions.

*"In 1963 my grandpa bought his first car."* (NOT ~~used to buy... or would buy...~~)
