

## What If I Don't Move to the Back of the Bus?

### *Rosa Parks story*



It's one of the most famous moments in modern American civil rights history: On the chilly evening of December 1, 1955, in the capital of Alabama, Rosa Parks, a 42-year-old seamstress boarded a segregated city bus to return home after a long day of work, taking a seat near the middle, just behind the front "white" section. At the next stop, more passengers got on. When every seat in the white section was taken, the bus driver ordered the black passengers in the middle row to stand so a white man could sit. The seamstress refused.

When Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat, she was arrested for violating the city's racial segregation ordinances. Her action sparked the Montgomery bus boycott, led by the Montgomery Improvement Association and Martin Luther King.

The bus boycott took a long time, but after 381 difficult days, the courts made an announcement – they said that segregation on buses was illegal. It was a great victory. A few days later, Rosa Parks took a bus again, and she sat right in the front.
