3. School teaches structure

Successful people are highly organized. Real world is all about timing and opportunities. If one is scatter-brained, have bad time management skills, they lose out. Hence, learning to be organized is paramount and schools teach exactly that!

"A journey of a thousand miles begin with a single step."

Being organized is not something that people inherit: it is more to do with how well you **organize** your daily routine and tasks to make sure that everything falls into place. All the **successful** people that you see around you did not achieve **success** overnight. Nor was **success** simply handed to them.

Schools help in laying the groundwork, helping to build the neural connections that they need for organized thinking as they get older.

Parents come in with are about executive functions (brain skills needed for planning, task completion and self-regulation). Why can't my child get ready in the morning? How come my child has a meltdown when he doesn't get what he wants? How come my child constantly loses things? How come my child finishes her homework but can't remember to turn it in?

"I believe the best way to prepare your child's brain for adulthood is to teach him to be an organized thinker," Dr. Damon Korb says

3. School teaches structure

School gives a sense of purpose and urgency. A sense of urgency helps get things done. Dealing with homework, different subjects, deadlines, time limits create structure for a child, helping them prepare for adulthood.

Children brought up without a structure, and without having their needs consistently met, are stressed, their levels of cortisol rise and it's actually damaging to the frontal lobe.



Why can't we learn to be organised in adulthood?

That frontal lobe of the brain, where executive function takes place, continues to grow until you're 25 to 28 years old. However, the more the neural pathways get ingrained, the stronger the habit would be. Therefore, it is good to start early.

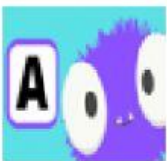
