



## TO LIKE

IS A REGULAR VERB AND IS MOST OFTEN FOLLOWED BY AN -ING FORM, BUT IT MAY ALSO BE FOLLOWED BY A FULL INFINITIVE.

Example: i like getting up early, but i also like to get up later at weekends

## For «Beginners»

WE MAY RIGHTFULLY CONSIDER THAT THOSE  
TWO FORMS CAN BE USED INDIFFERENTLY.

Example: I like singing and dancing with my friends; I  
like talking and hanging around with them, too...

= I like to sing and dance with my friends; I like to talk  
and hang around with them too...

# REMINDER!

A verb ending with the following pattern: "consonant + vowel + consonant", must double the final consonant: -get => getting; run = running; BUT eat=> eating.
