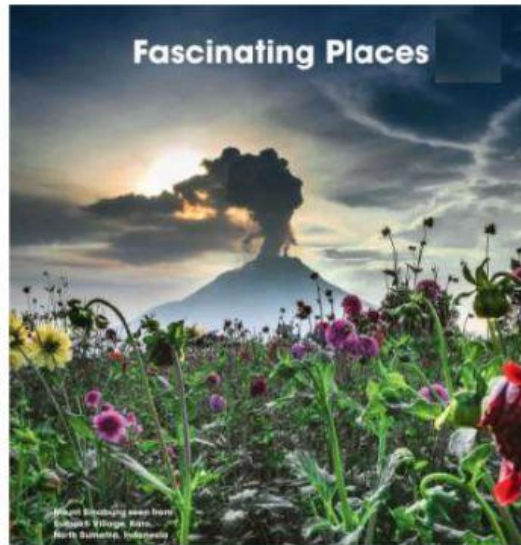
The Museo Subacuática de Arte
