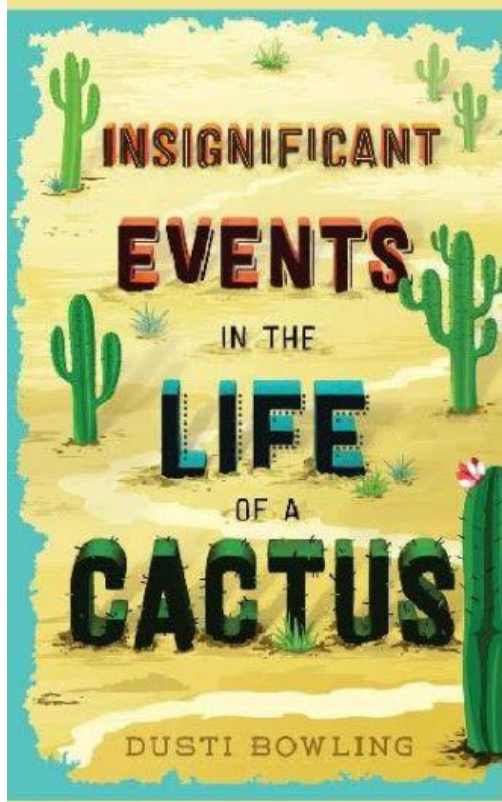




A girl born without arms...
