Grammar: Subject-Verb
Agreement

- In a sentence that tells about now, singular subjects use a verb that ends in -s.


The teacher sits in the bleachers.

- In a sentence that tells about now, plural subjects use a verb without the -s.

The teachers sit in the bleachers.
