

Simple Present Tense: Introduction

Simple Present Tense talks about things that are generally and always true. We use the verb "be" (am, is, are) to express a state of being and emotion. We use the verb "have/has" to express possession, own, hold for use, or contain.

Have and has indicate possession in the present tense (describing events that are currently happening). Have is used with the pronouns I, you, we, and they, while has is used with he, she, and it. The main definition of "do" is "to accomplish an action." The main definition of "does" is "a reference to the accomplishment of another." Both words mean basically the same thing, because "does" is the third person singular present tense version of "do."
