Type 0	always, usually, often, sometimes, never, etc.	
	if clause	result clause
	Present Simple	Present Simple
	If it rains,	I always take an umbrella.
	If it doesn't rain,	I usually walk in the park.
	If it rains,	I don't walk in the park.
	If it doesn't rain,	I don't take an umbrella.

Type 1	in the future (tomorrow, etc.)	
	if clause	result clause
	Present Simple	will / won't
	If it rains,	I will take an umbrella.
	If it doesn't rain,	I will walk in the park.
	If it rains,	I won't walk in the park.
	If it doesn't rain,	I won't take an umbrella.

Zero conditional:

We use zero conditional to talk about things that are generally true as a result of an action or situation.
