Possessive Nouns

A possessive noun shows who or what owns something.

Examples:

The boy's bike is missing.

The boys' bike is missing.

Both boy's and boys' are possessive nouns. In the first sentence, the bike belongs to one boy. In the second sentence, the bike belongs to more than one boy.

A noun that shows ownership is a possessive noun.

• To turn a singular noun into a possessive noun, add an apostrophe (') and an - s.

Example:

- 1. The boy's bike is missing.
- To turn a plural noun into a possessive noun, add an apostrophe (') to the noun after the - s, but if the noun is irregular add an apostrophe and - s.

Examples:

- 1. The boys' bike is missing.
- The children's bike is missing.
