## 1) Questions in the Simple Present Tense

To make a question in English we normally use Do or Does. It has no translation in Spanish though it is essential to show we are making a question (we could say that it replaces the initial question mark from Spanish questions). It is normally placed at the beginning of the question.

**Affirmative:** I/ You/ We/ They **speak** English.

**Question:** **Do** I/ You/ We/ They **speak** English?

You will see that we add **DO** at the beginning of the affirmative sentence to make it a question. We use **Do** when the subject is **I, you, we** or **they**.

**Affirmative:** He/ She/ It **speaks** French.

**Question:** **Does** he/ she/ it speak French?

When the subject is **he, she** or **it**, we add **DOES** at the beginning to turn the affirmative sentence into a question.

We **DON'T** use **Do** or **Does** in questions that have the verb **To Be** in those cases what we must do is the following:

<u>Affirmative sentence</u>	<u>Question with to-be.</u>	<u>Answer</u>
<i>I <b>am</b> in Santiago.</i>	<i><b>Am</b> I in Santiago?</i>	<i>Yes, I <b>am</b></i> <i>No, I <b>am not</b></i>
<i>We/ you/ they <b>are</b> in the middle of the street.</i>	<i><b>Are</b> We/ you/ they in the middle of the street?</i>	<i>Yes, We/ you/ they <b>are</b></i> <i>No, We/ you/ they <b>are not/ aren't</b></i>
<i>She/he/ it <b>is</b> boring.</i>	<i><b>Is</b> She/he/ it boring?</i>	<i>Yes, She/he/ it <b>is</b></i> <i>No, She/he/ it <b>is not/isn't</b></i>
