- The name orangutan means "man of the forest" in the Malay language.
- It lives in a tropical rain forest in parts of Sumatra and Borneo in Asia.
- Size: Standing height: An adult orangutan **can** be 4 to 5 feet tall.
- An adult male orangutan **can** weigh up to 100 kilograms.
- An adult female **can** weigh about half what a male does.
- It is **the largest** of all arboreal animals.
- Orangutan finds its food in the trees where it lives. More than half its diet consists of fruit. It also eats nuts, bark, and other parts of plants and trees. Sometimes, it eats insects **such as** ants and termites, as well as bird eggs.
- It finds the water for drinking up in the trees—in hollows, on leaves, or even on its own fur after a rain.
- It is very rare and in danger. The cutting down of trees— deforestation and other human activities, **like** hunting, have placed the orangutan in danger of extinction.
- We can find information on the website of the Orangutan Foundation. The website explains how we can help to protect it. **For example**, it's possible to 'adopt' an orangutan.
