

## O. Henry

O. Henry was the pen name of William Sydney Porter (1862-1910), one of the \_\_\_\_\_ famous of American short story writers. He was the son of a doctor, but led an unsettled life in his early years, working successively as his father dispenser, a Texas ranch hand and a bank cashier. In his last employment he was accused \_\_\_\_\_ embezzlement \_\_\_\_\_ bank funds. He fled to South America to escape arrest, but returned on hearing that his wife was ill. He was arrested and \_\_\_\_\_ to five years in prison. On his release he lived in extreme poverty in New York, drinking heavily and writing short stories to support himself. He died \_\_\_\_\_ consumption.
