



4C *something, anything, nothing, etc.*

people

- +** **Somebody / Someone** has taken my pen!
- I didn't speak to **anybody / anyone**.
- ?** Did **anybody / anyone** phone?
- x** No, **nobody / no one**. **Nobody / No one** phoned.

things

- +** I bought **something** for dinner.
- I didn't do **anything** at the weekend.
- ?** Is there **anything** in the fridge?
- x** No, **nothing**. There's **nothing** in the fridge.

places

- +** Let's go **somewhere** this weekend.
- We didn't go **anywhere** this summer.
- ?** Is there **anywhere** to park?
- x** No, **nowhere**. There's **nowhere** to park.

4C *something, anything, nothing, etc.*

- Use *somebody / someone, something, somewhere* with a + verb when you don't say exactly who, what, or where.
- Use *anybody / anyone, anything, anywhere* in questions or with a – verb. ***I didn't do anything last night.*** NOT ~~*I didn't do nothing.*~~
- Use *nobody / no one, nothing, nowhere* in short answers or in sentences with a + verb.


