note that MUSTN'T is the negative of must AND have to

HAVE TO

somebody or something tells you eg. the boss, the law

+

You **have to** wear a seatbelt when you drive. It's the law!
My boss says I **have to** work on Saturday morning.

-

You **mustn't** drink and drive. It's the law!
You **mustn't** call me at work. We aren't allowed personal calls.

MUST

you personally feel you should do it

+

I **must** buy some milk later. I have some guests coming over.
You **must** go to bed earlier if you want to wake up fresh.

-

I **mustn't** eat too much pizza. I'm getting fat!
You **mustn't** smoke so many cigarettes. They will kill you!

DON'T HAVE TO

it is not necessary

I **don't have to** get to work till 11am tomorrow. My boss is away.
You **don't have to** bring a big coat to Colombia. It's very warm.
We **don't have to** eat at home tonight. We could go out.
