

## Language note

An E-mail is a quick and easy way to write to anyone, wherever they are in the world. It's a kind of informal writing that uses 'colloquial language'. The colloquial language is natural language that is used between friends in informal speech and writing. It varies considerably from place to place. No one expects you to learn it all, but don't be afraid to ask the meaning if you see a phrase you don't understand. Here are a few examples:

| Australia:  | See you this arvo. (We'll meet this afternoon.) |
| Scotland:   | Nae bother. (It's not a problem.)               |

| England:    | Innit. (=isn't it?) Eyup (=Hello.)              |
