## Writing

## Writing effective e-mails

- **An email should be clear and concise.** Avoid long introductions and details. Using as few words as possible, introduce who you are, context if necessary, and why you are emailing. Jump to the point. State it clearly using minimal words. Don't be ambiguous.
- **Be personal.** Address the person by name, sign the email with your own name and a friendly comment like "Enjoy your weekend!"
- **Use simple English.** An email shouldn't be too formal. Write like you talk, using conversational English. Be authentic and realistic.
- **Format matters.** Make emails easy to read keeping paragraphs short. Highlight keywords (bold or italic) for emphasis.
- **Review for simplicity and clarity.** Read through the finished email and remove unnecessary words or sentences.

An email is not usually a very formal message. In emails you can use contractions, short forms and abbreviations, such as **asap**, which means "as soon as possible".

Other common abbreviations are:

- **btw** "by the way"
- **fyi** "for your information"
- **imo** "in my opinion"
- **iow** "in other words"
- **tia** "thanks in advance"
