Very rarely



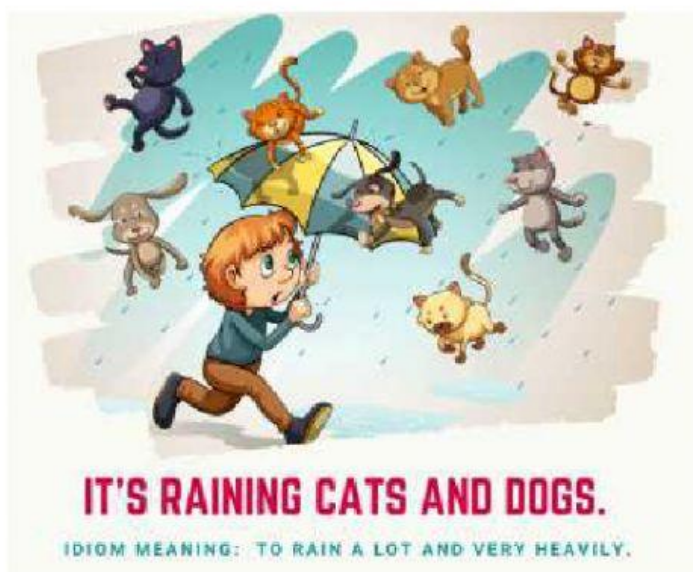
Cold Light of Day

Make an extra effort



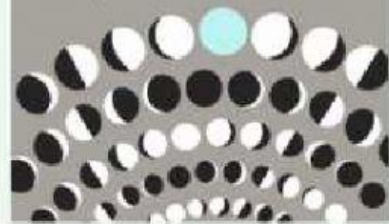
Butterflies in my stomach

Use influence that's based on personal connections



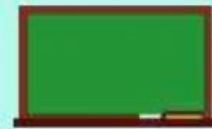
A Life Of Its Own
