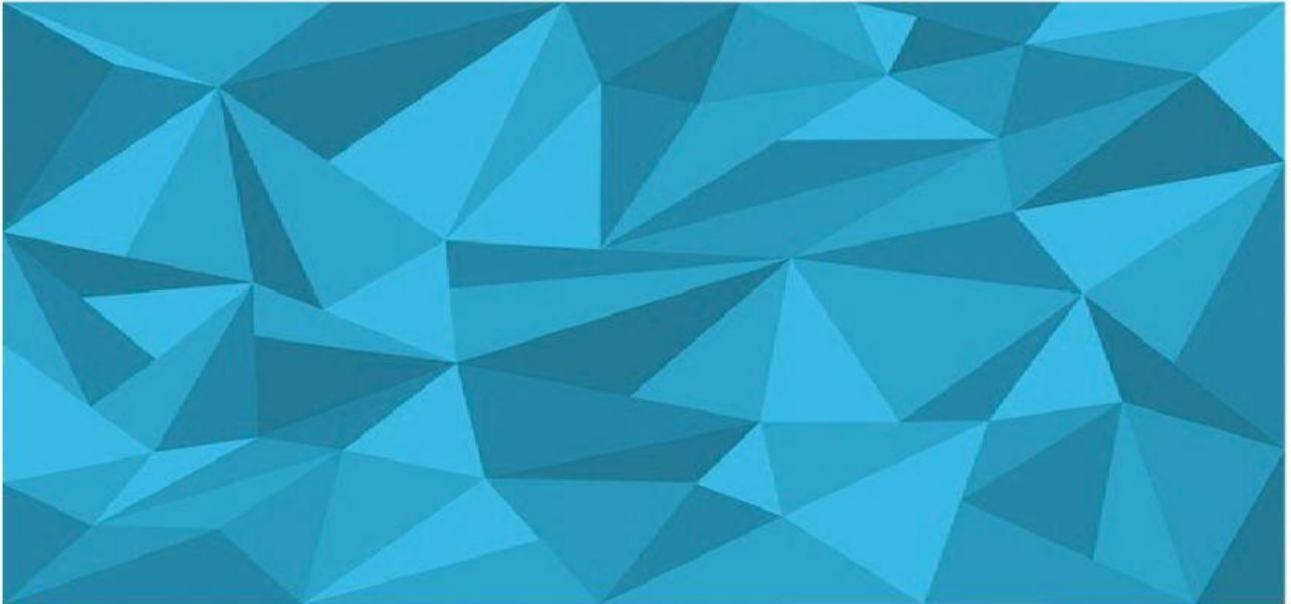

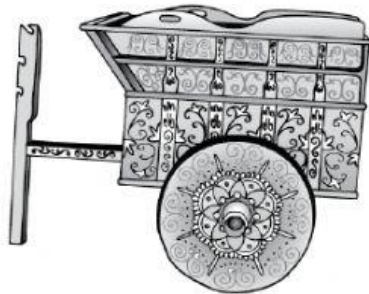

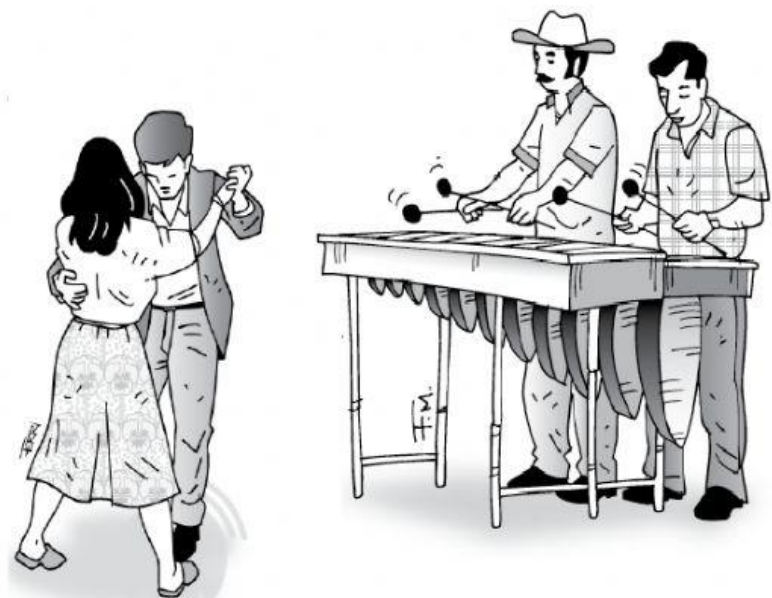

September 15th: Celebration of Independence Day in Costa Rica

Independence from Spain came to Costa Rica without war or violence. Thanks to the peaceful but yet strong effort to be free and autonomous. On September 14th, 1821 there was a big meeting in Guatemala where most of the people voted to become independent from Spain. Therefore, not only Costa Rica, but also the whole Central America obtained their freedom and independence.



In Costa Rica we celebrate the 14th with two important traditions. First, the Torch of Liberty, which is a fire passed torch by torch, coming from Guatemala, representing the way Costa Ricans were notified as independent from Spain. And second, the "Faroles" parade; it starts by playing the National Anthem by local bands at 6:00 pm, which is also transmitted on radio. Following this musical tribute to Independence, all of the schools participate in a parade around their hometown. Parents and kids carry hand crafted lamps or lanterns with candles inside. People sing different Independence songs like "La Patriotica" and "La Diana".

On the 15th, all of the schools in Costa Rica, have a variety of events. These include: parades with marching bands, theatrical performances, concerts, sports events, and others. Many people enjoy dressing up with traditional customs, or they just wear something red, blue or white to enhance their patriotic feelings and show the pride of being Costa Rican.
