

Simple Subjects

RULES

The **simple subject** is the main word in the complete subject.

You know that every sentence has two parts—a subject and a predicate. The complete subject is all the words in the subject part of a sentence. The simple subject tells exactly who or what the sentence is about. The simple subject in each sentence below is underlined.

Complete Subject **Many people**
This city in Texas

simple subject **people**
Texas

Complete Predicate **lives in Austin.**

is a fun place to visit.
