

THE PRESENT CONTINUOUS TENSE by Fulay BOZKURT

We use the **Present Continuous Tense**

- a. to describe an action that is happening now. (I am teaching present continuous tense now)
- b. to talk about actions and situation in progress around now (these days) -to describe temporary situations (I am studying in Germany as an exchange student)
- c. to describe FUTURE ARRANGEMENTS(I am flying to London tomorrow) ; especially when the time and place have been decided.(Ali is getting married at 3 tomorrow)
- d. for changing and developing situations(More and more forests are disappearing because of fires in our country)
- e. with ALWAYS when we want to express our irritation or annoyance at actions which happen too often. (You are always telling me lies. Enough!)

Time expressions: *now* *nowadays*
 at present *right now*
 at the moment *these days*
 today *this week*

Affirmative form	Subject + am/is/are + Verb (ing) + Complement
	I am learning English right now.
Negative form	Subject + am not/Isn't/aren't + Verb (ing) + Complement
	Mrs. Poe isn't going home now.
Question form	Am/is/are + Subject + Verb (ing) + Complement
	Are you working in the kitchen today?
Negative Question Form	Am...not/Isn't/aren't + Subject + Verb (ing) + Complement
	Isn't Ernest waiting for us at school?
