

Past Tense - Regular Verbs

Use the simple past tense to talk about completed events and activities.

Statements with Past Tense Verbs		
Affirmative	For all regular verbs, add an -ed ending in the past tense.	My mother knitted my sweater. I cleaned the kitchen. The children played games. You worked hard.
Negative	For negative past tense verbs, use did not (or didn't) before the base verb.	We didn't own a TV. He didn't have a computer. They didn't hear the news. I didn't live in Ottawa last year.

The spelling of past tense regular verbs depends on the ending - **consonant** (C) or **vowel** (V).

Spelling Rules		
-y after a consonant	Change -y to i and add -ed	try/ tried carry/ carried dry/ dried
C+V+C for a one-syllable verb	Double the final consonant and add -ed	plan/ planned stop/ stopped plug/ plugged
C+V+C for two-syllable verb	Double the final consonant only if the last syllable is stressed	permit/ permitted prefer/ preferred occur/ occurred
-e	Add only -d	tie/ tied change/ changed live/ lived
other	Add -ed to the simple form of all other regular verbs.	want/ wanted ask/ asked belong/ belonged

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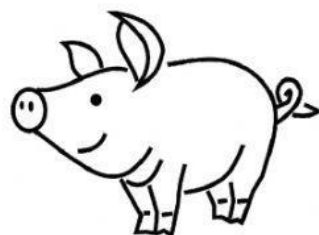
