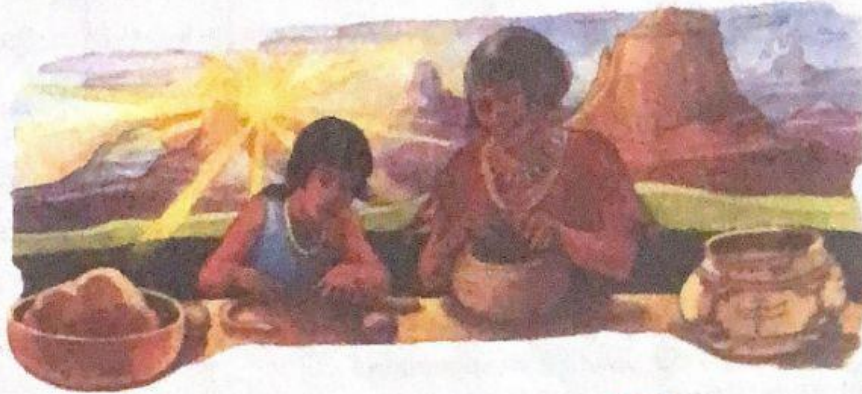




As you read the story, think about the sequence of steps the girl follows to make a clay pot.



Coiling the Pot

"My grandmother showed me how to make clay pots," Grandma said, "and now I give this knowledge to you, Marta. Some day, you will show your daughter so that our traditions will not be lost."

Earlier, Grandma and Marta had walked by the goat field on their way to the stream to dig clay. "I first came here for clay 70 years ago," Grandma recalled.

At home, Grandma cut a slab of clay. "First, we make the base," she explained.

Next, Grandma kneaded a handful of clay into a ball. Then Marta too shaped some clay into a ball.

"Roll the ball into an even rope," Grandma instructed. Marta tried, but her clay rope was thick at the ends, while in the middle it was too thin. "Rolling clay takes practice and patience," said Grandma.

"Now we'll place the first coil on the base," Grandma explained. "The ends should meet, so cut away the extra clay."

Once the first coil was in place, Grandma's fingers smoothed the coil down onto the base. She moistened the coil with slip, a mixture of water and clay, while saying, "The first coil is most important."

Marta rolled a second rope of clay and placed it on top of the first. Again Grandma smoothed it while Marta rolled more coils. Soon, the small pot took shape.

"The pot must stand before we trim it," Grandma explained, "so come help me in the garden." Outside, Grandma hoed her squash plants, while Marta picked beans.

Back in the house, the pot was firm, but not hard. Grandma slowly turned the pot. In one hand, she held a trimming tool that she used to carefully trim away the bumps. Soon, the pot was smooth.

"Next, the pot needs to be fired in the oven," Grandma said. "Once it is finished, we can paint it, glaze it, and finally fire it one last time. It's a good thing you'll be here all summer."

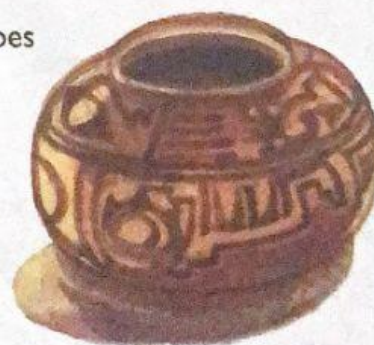
