

There is / There are



Meaning: We use there is and there are to say that something exists or does not exist.

In the positive:

There is + singular noun = There is a cat.
There are + plural noun = There are two cats.
There is + uncountable noun = There is some water on the floor.
(Note: we use **SOME** with uncountable nouns, you could also use a few, a little, a lot, etc.)

In the negative:

There isn't + singular noun = There isn't a cat in the garden.
There aren't + plural noun = There aren't two cats in the garden.
There isn't + uncountable noun = There isn't any milk in the fridge.
(Note: we use **any** with uncountable nouns in the negative)

In a question:

There is a dog in the kitchen = Is there a dog in the kitchen?
There are dogs in the kitchen = Are there dogs in the kitchen?
(Note: when forming a question the verb to be is at the beginning of the question)
There is some juice in the glass = Is there some juice in the glass?

Contractions:

There is = There's
There are = There are
There isn't = There is not
There aren't = There are not
