Hi Katy!

How are things going? I'm already into the second month of the spring semester, and I've got a lot of work to do. For science class, I have to write a term paper. The professor made ~~ever~~^{up} a list of possible topics. After looking over them, I think I've picked one out. I'm going to write about chimpanzees and animal intelligence. I've already looked some information about them online up. I found up some very interesting facts.

Did you know that their hands look very much like their feet, and that they have fingernails and toenails? Their thumbs and big toes are "opposable." This makes it easy for them to pick things out with both their fingers and toes. Their arms are longer than their legs. This helps out them, too, because they can reach fruit growing on thin branches that would not otherwise support their weight. Adult males weigh between 90 and 115 pounds (40 and 52 kilograms), and they are about 4 feet (1.2 meters) high when they stand out.

Like humans, chimpanzees are very social. They travel in groups called "communities." Mothers bring out their chimps, who stay with them until about the age of seven. Even after the chimps grow up, there is still a lot of contact with other chimpanzees.
