1. Group of words that contain a subject and a verb.
2. Words that express a strong feeling, followed by a!
3. Person, place or thing.
4. Marked by or dealing with one's own experiences or life history.
5. Told from "I", "me", or "my". I'm telling the story.
6. A figure of speech that describes an object or an action in a way that isn't literally true, but helps explain an idea or make a comparison.
7. Words that are used instead of a noun and refer to a noun that has already been used or mentioned. (Mine, his, hers, its, ours, theirs, etc)
8. Words used to modify/limit or restrict the meaning of verbs. Tells us how, when, where, how much. (carefully, badly, above, etc)
9. Story told using "she/he" or "her/his"
10. A comparison of two things based on their being alike in some way.
11. The real meaning is concealed or contradicted.
12. The main idea or the meaning behind the story, the message the author is trying to get across.

13. Narrative, written from the perspective of an author, about important parts of their life.
14. A person who is in the story.
15. A figure of speech comparing two unlike things that are often introduced by "like" or "as".
16. Implied or indirect reference: the use of references. "The act of alluding to something"
17. Word used to describe an action. State or occurrence. (smell, tell, want, sweep, think, speak, etc)
18. Words used to describe the qualities or states of being nouns, also describe the quantity of nouns or pronouns. (silly, fun, fast, many, few, millions, etc)
19. Words that show the relationship and location between a noun or pronoun and some other word or element in the rest of the sentences (with, at, about, like, up, off, etc)
20. Words that connect two words or clauses or sentences/phrases and show the relationship between them. (despite, unless, after, but, besides, therefore)
21. When an author refers back to something that has already taken place in the story.
22. The feeling, impression, or atmosphere the author creates in their writing.
23. Story told from "you", "your". You are being told the story.
24. A character that represents a particular opinion or image about a group of people.
25. Tendency to prefer one person or thing to another.
26. Vivid description or writing to create a sense of image or idea.
27. A pattern of words to show that two or more ideas have the same level of importance.
