A damp cold day in February, after a game, the players from the Stowmarket team look exhausted and very very unhappy. Well, you can understand it. They have just (1) their game 19-1.

Welcome to the world of women's football! The team that (2) Stowmarket is Fulham LFC, the only fully professional women's side in Britain.

Fulham LFC has players of all (3), from 17 -year-old Chantelle White to Permi Jhooti, a 30-year-old who is just finishing her doctorate in computer science. 'If I'm lucky,' she says, 'I'll be able to play (4) another five years. I do have another occupation, though, and (5) what I'll be doing for the rest of my life.
