a) Study these class notes:

LIKE can be a verb; it is similar to “love”:

I **really like** your dress! = I **love** your dress!

He **likes** fish **very much**. = He **loves** fish.

LIKE can be an adverb; it means “the same way as”:

They move **like** dancers. = They move **as if** they were dancers.

LIKE can be a preposition; it means “the same as” or “very similar to”:

He’s just **like** his father. = He’s the same as his father.

LIKE can be a conjunction; it means “such as” or “for example”:

There are many monuments in Paris, **like** the Eiffel Tower.
