FORMULA

AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES

Formula for affirmative sentences.

Subject + will be + present participle + object

•He/She/It/I/We/They + will be + present participle.

EXAMPLES

- She **will be taking** her lesson in music in the morning.
- He **will be reading** the paper then.
- You **will be driving** the car this evening.

NEGATIVE SENTENCES

Subject + will not be + present participle + object

EXAMPLES

- She **will not be taking** her lesson in music in the morning.
- He **will not be reading** the paper then.
- You **will not be driving** the car this evening.

INTERROGATIVE SENTENCES (QUESTIONS)

Will + subject + be + present participle + object + ?

EXAMPLES

- **Will she be taking** her lesson in music in the morning?
- **Will he be reading** the paper then?
- **Will you be driving** the car this evening?

RULES & USAGE

USAGE	EXAMPLE
To show the action that will be ongoing at some specific time in future.	They will be playing basketball at 9 p.m. tomorrow.
To show an action that will definitely happen in future.	They will be celebrating their first anniversary next week.
To show a routine action that will be happening in future.	He will be attending the meeting on first Monday of the next month.
To ask about anyone's future plan.	Will you be watching movie this evening?

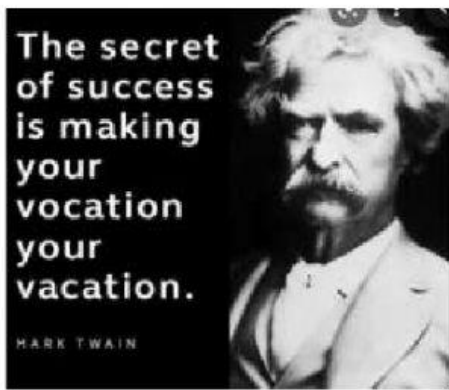
