All animals that have a backbone are called vertebrates.

Invertebrates are animals without a backbone. Spiders and insects are invertebrates. Some spiders are Tarantulas and Wolf Spiders. Some insects are bees, grasshoppers, ants, butterflies, mosquitoes and cockroach. Any animal that does not have a backbone is an invertebrate.
