Skills to develop	LISTENING AND SPEAKING
OBJECTIVE	
In this lesson, students will practice grammatical structures for talking about future plans and decisions: the present continuous, will + infinitive and going to + infinitive.	

The lesson is suitable for both classroom practice and self-study

Warm-up (activity)



We use different verb forms to talk about our plans for the future, depending on what kind of plan it is: a spontaneous plan, a pre-decided plan or an arrangement.

WILL vs GOING TO

WILL	GOING TO
Express future actions decided at the moment of speaking (Immediate decisions) I will have sold and the fish.	Express future plans decided before the moment of speaking (Prior plans) I am going to visit my aunt next Friday.
Express a prediction based on personal opinions or experiences (Predictions without evidence) I think United will win the game.	Express a prediction based on present evidence (Predictions with evidence) Look at those black clouds! It is going to rain.
Express a future fact The sun will rise tomorrow.	Express something that is about to happen Get back! the bomb is going to explode.
Both Will and Going to can be used for making future predictions without having a real difference in meaning. I think it will be foggy tomorrow. = I think it is going to be foggy tomorrow.
