Wendy: Well, yes, it was **excited / exciting**. But after a while, I think Pi was probably **bored / boring** on that boat. He was on it for 227 days!

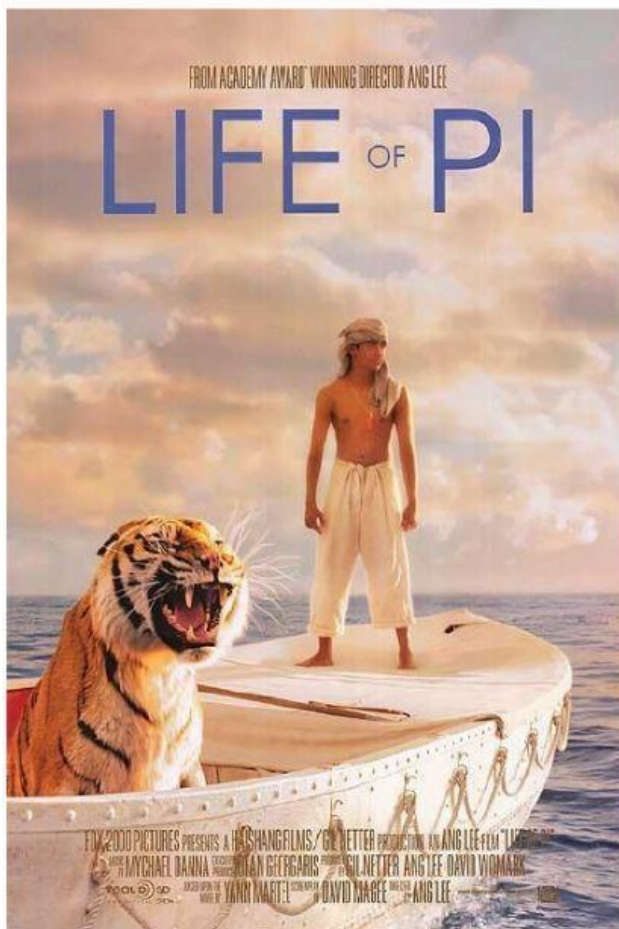
