Bringing Pompeii back to life

The ancient Roman city of Pompeii in Italy was buried under volcanic rock in AD 79. (0) In recent years, however, many parts of the city have fallen down, and many parts have been closed to the public. The city was in danger and many experts were getting angry that the city wasn't being protected. (1)_____ The World Heritage site is now the scene of an ambitious restoration project. It is hoped that work being carried out now will mean that future generations will be able to visit and explore this amazing historical place.

Today, more than 200 experts and technicians are at work in Pompeii's ruins. As well as architects and archaeologists, there are painters and photographers, dentists and biologists, computer scientists and experts in art restoration. (2) _____ Not only that, but they are looking again at the bodies of people who died in the disaster. Although the data analysis is in the early stages, it is already opening a window on life in the Roman Empire. (3) _____ Indeed, one expert has said that a typical New Yorker of today would feel at home in the streets of the ancient city. Pompeii was a city of fast food restaurants, lively theatres and busy markets.

One of the most interesting of the volcano's casualties is an unusually tall man, dressed in very strange clothing. The shape of his clothes, and the shape and size of his body, were preserved in the volcanic rock that covered him. (4)_____ It is now believed that this man was a typical resident of first-century Pompeii, which, like today's London or New York, had a lot of ethnic diversity.

Pompeii was a rich city of Roman citizens, naturalized foreigners and freedmen (former slaves) who were working in business. Many of the people in the city had a very good diet. (5)_____ A surprising number of products used in the city were not from Italy. The city had a very commercial culture, with food arriving every day from many different parts of the empire. Life was good in Pompeii – but, sadly, the good life wasn't to last. When the volcano of nearby Mount Vesuvius erupted, almost everybody in the city was killed.
