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HOW TO PRONOUNCE -ed AT THE END OF A VERB

There are **three different ways** to pronounce the 'ed' ending of regular verbs in the simple past tense: /ɪd/, /t/ or /d/. The pronunciation depends on **the sound at the end of the infinitive** of the verb.

/ɪd/	/t/	/d/
This is the least common -ed sound	-Words that end in /p/, /k/, /f/, /s/, /sh/, /ch/ <u>sound</u> :	This is the most common -ed sound
-Words that end in /t/ or /d/ <u>sound</u> :	Kissed /kɪst/	-Words that end in any other sound :
Wanted /ˈwɒn.tɪd/	Laughed /lɑːft/	Closed /kləʊzd/
Needed /ˈniː.dɪd/	Asked /ɑːskt/	Saved /seɪvd/
Started /stɑːrtɪd/	Stopped /stɒpt/	Travelled /ˈtræv.əld/
Decided /dɪˈsaɪ.dɪd/	Watched /wɒtʃt/	Opened /ˈəʊ.pənd/
	Washed /wɒʃt/	Climbed /klaɪmd/
