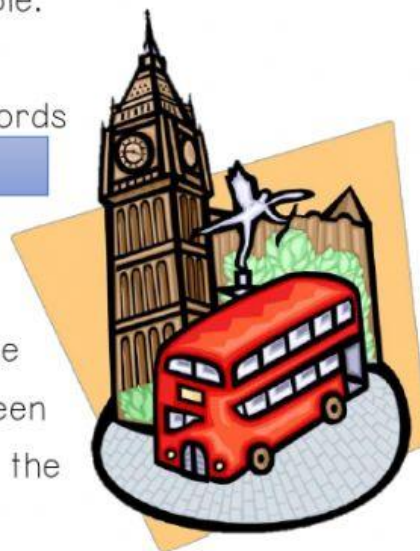


American and British English

Printing was a relatively new invention back then and the spelling [] most words had not yet been formalized, [] accounts for many of the differences in spelling.
