Separable verbs

clean up / check out / pick up

f)	To search for and find a piece of information in a book or database.
g)	To advance to maturity; develop into an adult.
h)	To do the things that are needed to help and protect (a person or animal).
i)	To spend time relaxing or socializing informally.
j)	To travel to many places.
k)	To keep watch; to look carefully at people or things around you in order to try to find a particular person or thing;
l)	To come into the presence or company of someone, especially by arrangement.
m)	To relax or enjoy oneself.
n)	To feel pleased and excited about something that is going to happen.
