How did SPAM get its name?

- Spam was first developed in 1937 at Austin, Minnesota, a pigfarming centre. The name is a contraction of spiced and ham.
- Each year 141 million tins are sold.
- Residents of Guam eat the most, an average of 16 cans per person per year.
- In his memoirs, Nikita Krushchev praised the fortifying effects of Spam on Soviet troops.
- The address of the Spam Museum is Spam Boulevard, Austin.
