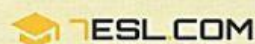

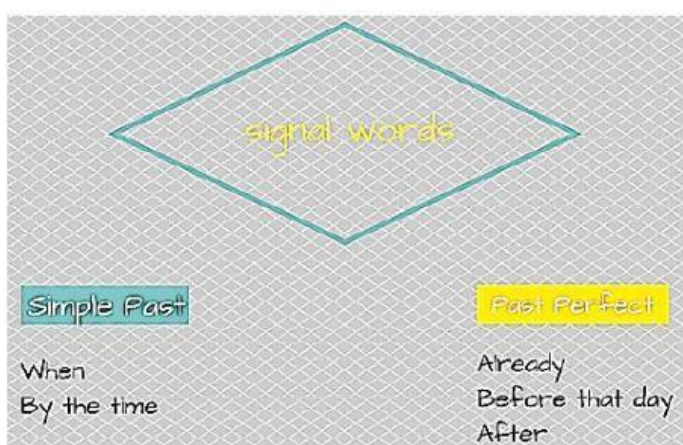
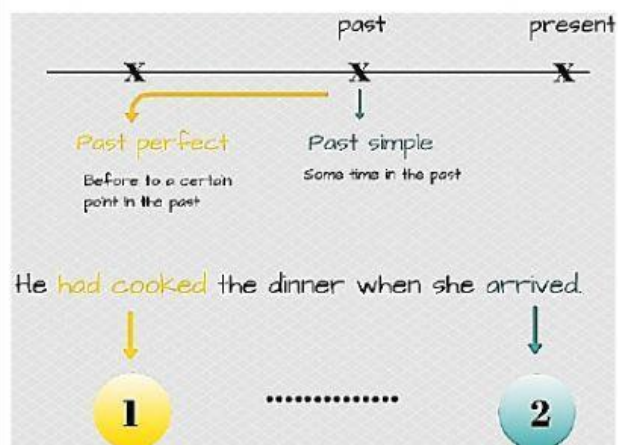

Remember

The formula for the past perfect tense is had + [past participle]. It doesn't matter if the subject is singular or plural; the formula doesn't change.

Don't use the past perfect when you're not trying to convey some sequence of events..
