

Risk Assessment

What is a risk assessment?

A risk assessment is an examination of a workplace environment where given tasks are undertaken. In short, the goal of the risk assessment is to highlight any hazards, and outline steps to prevent harm.

What are the five steps to risk assessment?

- Step 1 identify the hazards
- Step 2 decide who may be harmed and how
- Step 3 evaluate risks and decide on control measures
- Step 4 record your findings
- Step 5 review the risk assessment

When should a risk assessment be carried out?

The HSE currently stipulate that you should carry out a risk assessment before you undertake work and needs to be updated any time there is a change in the workplace, e.g. a new machinery is used, a device is fixed, tasks have been changed, etc.

Who can do risk assessments?

The HSE currently state that specific training or qualifications are not essential to carry out a risk assessment. However, they do state that as an employer you must appoint someone who is competent, with the necessary skills, knowledge and experience to manage health and safety in your organisation.

Why do we do a risk assessment?

To ensure that all groups of people including but not limited to employees, contractors, and members of the public are protected from risk of injury or ill health.

Is risk assessment a legal requirement?

If you are an employer, or even self-employed, then it is a legal requirement to assess the health and safety risks arising from work undertaken.
