

- NEVER SAY YOU CAN'T -

Imagine you couldn't see anything. Now imagine you couldn't hear anything either. What would your life be like? How would you communicate with other people? How would you look after yourself? Helen Keller was born over 100 years ago. She wrote 11 books, met 12 US presidents and travelled to 39 countries in spite of being blind and deaf.

Helen was born in the small farm town of Tuscumbia, Alabama, in 1880. She was a bright, healthy child but when she was 19 months old, she had a high fever. After she recovered, she couldn't see or hear anything. She had entered a dark, silent world. She could only recognise people by feeling their faces or their clothes.

Helen used to get very frustrated and angry. Her parents knew they had to get help. When Helen was seven, they found a special teacher named Anne Sullivan. Anne had once been blind too, but operations had restored her sight. Anne taught Helen the signs for letters of the alphabet and how to spell. Unfortunately, Helen didn't understand what the signs meant. One day, Anne held Helen's hand under a water pump and signed the letters for 'water' in her other hand.



The girl suddenly understood the connection between signs and things. She called it a miracle, and the experience changed her life forever. On the way home, Helen learnt the signs for 30 new words!

By the time she was 10, Helen had learnt to speak by feeling her teacher's mouth when she was talking. By the age of 20, she had learnt to read French, German, Greek and Latin in Braille - a system of raised dots representing letters. In 1900, Helen went to Radcliffe College and, while she was there, she wrote her first book: *The Story of My Life*. It became an international best seller!

For the rest of her life, Helen Keller gave speeches, did research and raised money for charities. She also campaigned to improve the lives of blind people who, at that time, were badly educated and lived in asylums. Two Oscar-winning movies were made about her extraordinary life. She died peacefully in her sleep in 1968, at the age of 87. Helen once said, 'Life is either a great adventure or nothing.' Obviously for Helen, life was truly a great adventure!
