REPORTED STATEMENTS

We use the verbs **SAY, TELL, CLAIM, INFORM, MENTION, STATE** to introduce a reported statement. Changes affect to verb tenses which give one step back in time, demonstratives, pronouns, possessives and time and place adverbs.

Pronouns and possessives change from **FIRST** or **SECOND** person to **THIRD** person

- THIS → THAT
- THESE → THOSE
- TODAY → THAT DAY
- YESTERDAY → THE DAY BEFORE
- TOMORROW → THE FOLLOWING/NEXT DAY
- NOW → THEN
- HERE → THERE
- NEXT YEAR → THE FOLLOWING YEAR

REPORTED QUESTIONS

We use the verbs **ASK, WONDER, WANT TO KNOW** to introduce a reported question.

- When we report **YES/NO QUESTIONS**, we use **IF/WHETHER + SUBJECT + VERB**
"Did you eat pizza yesterday?" Ann told Peter → Ann asked Peter if he had eaten pizza the day before

- When we report **WH-QUESTIONS**, we use the **QUESTION WORD + SUBJECT + VERB**
"Why are you crying now?" She said to me → She wanted to know why I had been crying then



REPORTED ORDERS AND COMMANDS

We use the verbs **ASK, ORDER, TELL, BEG, WARN** or **ADVISE** to introduce a reported order or command. These verbs are always followed by an **OBLIGATORY OBJECT**. Also, the **imperative becomes an infinitive**.

"Be careful". He said → He asked **ME TO BE** careful

"Don't worry". The doctor said to us → The doctor ordered **US NOT TO WORRY**

REPORTED SUGGESTIONS

We use the verbs **SUGGEST** or **RECOMMEND** to introduce a suggestion in reported speech. These verbs are followed by a **gerund** or a **that clause**.

"Why don't we go out to eat something?", John said.

- John suggested **going out** to eat something

- John suggested **that we should go out** to eat something

- John suggested **that we went out** to eat something.

HOW TO EXPRESS SUGGESTIONS

"Let's stay at home and see a film."

"Why don't we go shopping on Saturday?"

"How about playing football tomorrow?"

"What about visiting your family?"

"I think we should go bowling."
