

39 mustn't, don't have to / don't need to

You **mustn't be late** for the exam. You **don't have to / don't need to** wait for me.

- We use *don't have to*, *didn't have to*, *don't need to* and *didn't need to* to say that something is not or was not necessary: You **don't have to** wait for me. I'll come later.
I **didn't need to** take a jacket – it was quite hot.

⚠ Must and have to are similar, but *mustn't* and *don't have to* are different.
Compare: I **mustn't** go. (It's forbidden to go.) I **don't have to** go.
(It isn't necessary for me to go. I can decide.)
