



# Like, love, don't like, hate +ing

We can use *like*, *don't like*, *love*, *hate* and *don't mind + ing* to say *how we feel about an activity*.

*I like going to the park, She loves playing games, They hate cleaning.*

Love means = it's great!. Like means = it's good. Don't mind means = it's OK.  
Don't like means = it's bad. Hate means = it's really bad!

After *love*, *like*, *don't mind*, *don't like* and *hate*, we usually use the verb with *ing*.



**I like + verb -ing**

*I like swimming.*



**I love + verb -ing**

*I love doing aerobics.*



**I don't like + verb -ing**

*I don't like playing football.*



**I hate + verb -ing**

*I hate skateboarding.*

*We love using the computer.*

*I like cooking.*

*She doesn't mind studying.*

*He doesn't like shopping.*

*They hate going to the dentist.*
