A. GRAMMAR

I. REPORTED SPEECH (CÂU TƯỜNG THUẬT)

We can use direct speech or reported speech when we talk or write about things people said in the past.

In direct speech, we use quotation marks (*dấu ngoặc kép*) and the exact words that somebody said. In reported speech, we give the meaning of what the person said, without quotation marks.

We use a reporting verb like **say (that)**, **tell someone (that)**, **explain (that)** or **promise (that)**.

1. Reported statements:

For example:

- 'I *worked* as a waiter before becoming a chef,' he said.
- ⇒ He said he *had worked* as a waiter before becoming a chef.
- 'I *will* phone you tomorrow,' he said.
- ⇒ He said he *would* phone me the next day.
- 'The baby *is sleeping*,' mommy said.
- ⇒ Mommy said the baby *was sleeping*.

Lưu ý:

- **Possessive and pronouns are also changed.**

Ex: Polly said, 'You can use *my* camera to take a photo of *yourself*.'

- ⇒ Polly said that *I* could use *her* camera to take a photo of *myself*.

- **We don't have to change the tense when the reporting is soon after the speaking and the statement is still true now.**

Ex: 'What's the matter with Max?'- 'He said he is hungry.' (= He is still hungry now.)

2. Reported questions:

We use reported questions when we talk about questions in past conversations (*cuộc hội thoại*).

The tense usually changes back in reported questions, and reported questions don't have quotation marks or a question mark.

USAGE	EXAMPLES
Reported questions use statement word order (subject before verb) and not question word order.	She asked me, 'Can you swim?' → She asked me <i>if I could swim</i> .
In reported information questions, we use the same question word as in the direct speech.	' <i>What</i> would you like to do tomorrow?' she asked Vicky. ⇒ She asked Vicky <i>what</i> she would like to do the next day.
In reported, <i>yes/no</i> questions we add <i>if</i> or <i>whether</i> after asked (+ object).	'Are you going to stay here?' he asked. ⇒ He asked <i>if/ whether</i> I was going to stay there.
We don't use <i>do, does</i> or <i>did</i> in reported <i>yes/no</i> questions.	She asked, 'Do you know him?' ⇒ She asked <i>if/ whether</i> we knew him. (She asked if we did know him.)
We use the same reported question pattern when we use phrases like <i>Could you tell me...?</i> or <i>Do you know...?</i> and <i>Let's ask...</i> The tense doesn't change in these sentences.	Could you tell me <i>what time the supermarket opens?</i> (Could you tell me what time does the supermarket open?)
We sometimes report questions and conversations in a summary sentence.	I asked Elizabeth <i>about her family</i> .

Ex: Nor do I./ Nor am I/ Nor would I./ Neither do I./ Neither have I.
