
#### PHRASAL VERBS WITH "KEEP"

| <p><b>Keep across</b></p> <p>Keep abreast of or up to date with; to keep people informed of</p> <p>E.g. We'll <b>keep across</b> this story for you as the events unfold.</p> | <p><b>Keep around</b></p> <p>Keep something near one</p> <p>E.g. It's worth <b>keeping</b> a dictionary <b>around</b> in case you come across an unfamiliar word.</p>       | <p><b>Keep away</b></p> <p>Refrain from coming (near)</p> <p>E.g. I'm <b>keeping away</b> from Joe until he calms down.</p>  |
| <p><b>Keep away from</b></p> <p>Avoid or evade</p> <p>E.g. He tried to <b>keep away from</b> danger.</p>  | <p><b>Keep down</b></p> <p>Repress</p> <p>E.g. China <b>keeps down</b> her dissidents very efficiently.</p>   | <p><b>Keep down</b></p> <p>Not to vomit</p> <p>E.g. It is difficult to <b>keep anything down</b> when you have the flu.</p>  |
| <p><b>Keep on</b></p> <p>Persist or continue</p> <p>E.g. Mum, Jimmy <b>keeps on</b> poling me!</p>  | <p><b>Keep on</b></p> <p>Cause or allow to remain in an existing position</p> <p>E.g. The new boss would like to <b>keep on</b> the present secretary.</p>                  | <p><b>Keep out</b></p> <p>Refrain from entering a place or condition</p> <p>E.g. After being warned, he <b>kept out</b>.</p> |
| <p><b>Keep out of</b></p> <p>Stay away from (a place or condition)</p> <p>E.g. I am <b>keeping out of</b> trouble.</p>  | <p><b>Keep to oneself</b></p> <p>Purposely avoid interaction with others; to be introverted</p> <p>E.g. She preferred to <b>keep to herself</b> after her husband died.</p> | <p><b>Keep up</b></p> <p>Stay even or ahead</p> <p>E.g. They ran so fast I could hardly <b>keep up</b>.</p>                  |

#### PHRASAL VERBS WITH "FALL"

| <p><b>Fall apart</b></p> <p>Meaning: Disintegrate</p> <p>E.g. My old briefcase is <b>falling apart</b>, I'll have to buy a new one.</p>                |
| <p><b>Fall away</b></p> <p>Meaning: Cease to support a person or cause</p> <p>E.g. After the divorce, all his friends <b>fell away</b> one by one.</p> |
| <p><b>Fall behind</b></p> <p>Meaning: Be late (for a regular event)</p> <p>E.g. You're <b>falling behind</b> with the rent.</p>                        |
| <p><b>Fall down</b></p> <p>Meaning: Fail</p> <p>E.g. That is where your reasoning <b>falls down</b>.</p>   |
| <p><b>Fall in</b></p> <p>Meaning: Collapse inwards</p> <p>E.g. The heavy rain caused the roof to <b>fall in</b>.</p>                                   |
| <p><b>Fall in with</b></p> <p>Meaning: Accept</p> <p>E.g. It seemed like a good idea, so we <b>fell in with</b> it.</p>                                |
| <p><b>Fall off</b></p> <p>Meaning: Become detached or to drop from</p> <p>E.g. A button <b>fell off</b> my coat.</p>                                   |
| <p><b>Fall out</b></p> <p>Meaning: Come out of something by falling</p> <p>E.g. I opened the cupboard and a can <b>fell out</b> onto my foot.</p>      |
