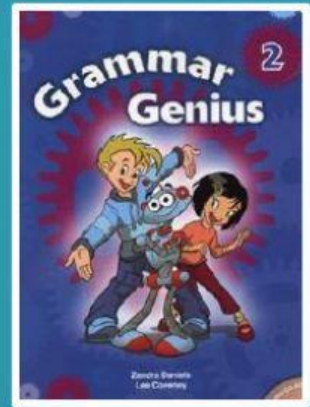


Both, either, neither



Ex.1. Join the sentences.
Use both ... and.

Model: Jane likes tennis. Matt likes tennis, too. -
Both Jane and Matt like tennis.

1. Paul is French. Anne is French, too.

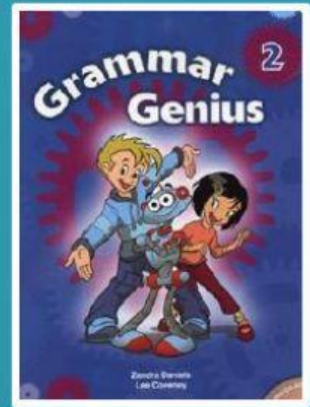
2. Kate has finished her homework. I have finished my homework, too.

Ex.2. Write sentences.
Use either ... or.

Model: What does she want for her birthday?
(a necklace, a bracelet) - I'm not sure.
She wants either a necklace or a bracelet.

1. Who won? (Helen, Jake)

I'm not sure.

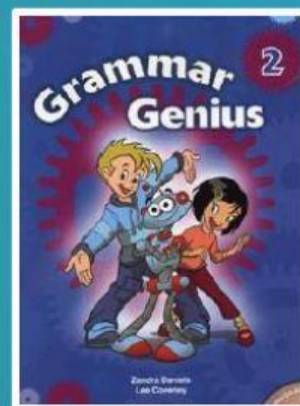
2. What did he buy? (a CD, a DVD)

3. Who made the cheese sandwiches? (Fiona, Sarah)

4. Who paid for the tickets? (Pete, Ian)

5. Who took the money? (Bill, Carol)

Both, either, neither



Ex.3. Join the sentences.
Use neither ... nor.

Model: Terry didn't see him. Jane didn't see him. – **Neither Terry nor Jim saw him.**

1. Dan can't help us. Eve can't help us.

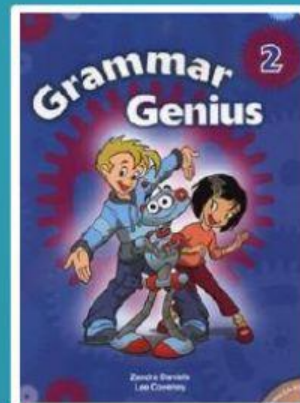
2. Jenny won't like the film. Adam won't like the film.

3. You can't dance. Lisa can't dance.

4. Fred didn't win. Diane didn't win.

5. Nick didn't go to the party. Pat didn't go to the party.
