

VELAR N [ŋ]

Theory:

The [ŋ] sound is a nasal-velar-voiced sound. (use the back part of your tongue to pronounce it.)

The [ŋ] sound only occurs in the middle and at the end of words.

Its most common spelling patterns are: **ng** or **ngue** at the end of words, like **in wrong, sing, waking, tongue.**

Also, the **letter n before g or k is** usually pronounced as a velar n [ŋ] like in the words: **hungry, single, thank, drink.**

Listen and repeat:
