like + -ing		
Affirmative	Negative	Question
I/you/we/they like watching old movies.	I/you/we/they don't like watching old movies.	Do I/you/we/they like watching old movies?
He/she/it likes playing in the park.	He/she/it doesn't like playing in the park.	Does he/she/it like playing in the park?
'd like to (= would like to)		
Affirmative	Negative	Interrogative
I'd/you'd/he'd/she'd/it'd/we'd/they'd like to go there tomorrow.	I/you/he/she/it/we/they wouldn't like to go there tomorrow.	Would I/you/he/she/it/we/they like to go there tomorrow?

like + -ing
We use <i>like + -ing</i> to talk about a general feeling which is true now.
<i>Richard likes skiing a lot.</i>
<i>Ella doesn't like listening to rap music.</i>
'd like to (= would like to)
We use <i>'d like to</i> to talk about a future ambition.
<i>I'd like to visit Kenya next year.</i>
<i>She wouldn't like to compete in the Ironman.</i>
