Modal Verbs

	Main similarities	Main differences
Will	❖ They express the future.	❖ <i>Will</i> refers to a future event, or to promises or predictions.
Be going to	❖ They can be contracted (I will = I'll // I am going to = I'm going to)	❖ <i>Be going to</i> refers to a fixed event in the future, or to express the speaker's intention.
