## AFFIRMATIVE AND NEGATIVE

Affirmative				Negative			
I	'm	going to	stay in a hotel. sleep in a tent.	I	'm not	going to	go climbing. take a helmet.
You / We / They	're			You / We / They	aren't		
She / He	's			She / He	isn't		

We use *going to* when we talk about planned events in the future. We construct it with the subject + the appropriate form of the verb *to be* + *going to* + an infinitive.
